Crochet Along*

'Under the Sea' is a blanket inspired by the incredible marine life to be found beneath, and above, the waves. Each square draws directly from a different marine creature or feature, each one surrounded by water. Using a range of stitches, the squares incorporate different shapes and textures to create a blanket that you'll love to feel as well as look at.

There are seven different motifs that, when joined together, create a 51.5"/131 cm square blanket.

Colourways

This blanket comes in 3 beautiful colourways

Colourway 1 – Fathoms Below

Uses Special DK with vivid blues, oranges and yellows, designed to inspire thoughts of tropical waters.

It uses 15 balls in total.

Colourway 2 – Beautiful Briny Sea

Uses Bambino and Bellissima in more muted blues and greens, designed to be much more like our native British seas. It uses 18 balls in total.

Colourway 3 – The Edge of the Water

Uses Batik in greens with warm pink, red and purple, designed to inspire thoughts of warm waters and coral reefs. It uses 35 balls in total and is available as a limited edition pack.

You'll see that a couple of colours use quite a lot of the 100g ball of yarn – shrimp (94g), in 'Fathoms Below', and toasted almond, (93g) in 'Beautiful Briny Sea'.

We've considered very carefully whether to include an extra ball of those colours in the recommended quantities and decided not to, but please be aware that it's possible you may have to buy an extra ball of yarn, if your tension varies.

The colour reproduction in this pattern is matched as closely as possible to the yarn but due to photography and printing restrictions some slight variations may occur.
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EQUIPMENT

4.5mm (UK 7 / US 7) crochet hook (or hook size to meet gauge)

Tapestry needle for sewing in ends

Stitch markers

Safety pins for joining (optional)

ABBREVIATIONS AND TERMINOLOGY

This project is not aimed at complete beginners or those relatively new to crochet and there is an assumption that you know your basic stitches and terminology.

STITCHES USED (UK & US TERMINOLOGY)

UK terms followed by US terms in (brackets)

Hdtr (Htc) = half double treble crochet (half treble crochet) = yarn over twice (three loops on hook), insert hook into stitch, yarn over and draw up a loop through stitch (four loops on hook) then yarn over and draw yarn through two loops (three loops on hook), yarn over, and draw yarn through all three remaining loops.

Htrtr (Hdtr) = half triple treble crochet (half double treble crochet) = yarn over three times (four loops on hook), insert hook into stitch, yarn over and draw up a loop through stitch (five loops on hook) then (yarn over and draw yarn through two loops) twice (three loops on hook), yarn over, and draw yarn through all three remaining loops.

Trtr (Dtr) = triple treble crochet (double treble crochet) = yarn over three times, insert hook into stitch; yarn over and draw through stitch; yarn over and draw through two loops four times.

Fptrtr (Fpdtr) = front post triple treble crochet (front post double treble crochet).

Spike dc (Spike sc) = an elongated dc (sc) worked into an indicated stitch or space in a row below current row.

Special stitch = see 'Big Shells' part round 16.

GAUGE

There are two ways to check your tension for this blanket; I suggest doing both, because they use different stitches, and you'll get the best results that way. It will also give you a chance to familiarise yourself with how I write patterns.

Bear in mind that if you don't achieve gauge, you'll use either less yarn (if your tension is tighter) or more yarn (if your tension is looser). You can always go up or down a hook size if you need to.

Use colour D for your test samples. You will have plenty of this left for the blanket.

Test one (UK terms):

- 1) With colour D, in a magic circle, ch1, then 6dc. Join with sl st to beginning dc. Pull the beginning yarn end tight to close the circle. (6 dc)
- 2) Ch3 (*counts as tr here and throughout*), then tr in same stitch, and 2tr in next five stitches. Join with sl st to beginning dc. (12 tr)
- 3) Ch3, then 6tr in same stitch. Work (skip next two stitches, then 7tr in next stitch) three times. Skip next two stitches. Join with sl st to beginning tr. (28 tr)
- 4) Ch1, then bptr around the same stitch (*which should be the first of 7tr*). Bptr around the next six stitches. *Work a spike stitch between two tr below current position in round two. Bptr around next seven stitches**. Repeat

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from * to ** three times, omitting final seven bptr. Join with sl st to beginning bptr. (28 bptr, 4 spike stitc h. 32 stitches in total)

- 5) Sl st across to fourth of seven bptr. Ch1, then dc in same stitch. *Skip next three stitches, then 9dtr in next stitch (*which should be a spike stitch*). Skip next three stitches, then dc in next stitch**. Repeat from * to ** three times, omitting final dc. Join with invisible join to beginning dtr. Break off yarn. (36 dtr, 4 dc, 40 stitches in total)

Your test piece should now measure 2.5"/6 cm square.

Test two (UK terms):

- 1) With colour D, in a magic circle, ch3, then 11 tr. Join with sl st to beginning tr. Pull the beginning yarn end tight to close the circle. (12 tr)
- 2) Ch3, then tr in same stitch, and 2tr in next eleven stitches. Join with invisible join to beginning dc. Break off yarn. (24 tr)

Your test piece should now measure 1.5"/4 cm in diameter.

Test one (US terms):

- 1) With colour D, in a magic circle, ch1, then 6sc. Join with sl st to beginning sc. Pull the beginning yarn end tight to close the circle. (6 sc)
- 2) Ch3 (*counts as dc here and throughout*), then dc in same stitch, and 2dc in next five stitches. Join with sl st to beginning dc. (12 dc)
- 3) Ch3, then 6dc in same stitch. Work (skip next two stitches, then 7dc in next stitch) three times. Skip next two stitches. Join with sl st to beginning dc. (28 dc)
- 4) Ch1, then bpdcc around the same stitch (*which should be the first of 7dc*). Bpdcc around the next six stitches. *Work a spike stitch between two dc below current position in round two. Bpdcc around next seven stitches**. Repeat from * to ** three times, omitting final seven bpdcc. Join with sl st to beginning bpdcc. (28 bpdcc, 4 spike stitch. 32 stitches in total)
- 5) Sl st across to fourth of seven bpdcc. Ch1, then sc in same stitch. *Skip next three stitches, then 9tc in next stitch (*which should be a spike stitch*). Skip next three stitches, then sc in next stitch**. Repeat from * to ** three times, omitting final sc. Join with invisible join to beginning tc. Break off yarn. (36 tc, 4 sc. 40 stitches in total)

Your test piece should now measure 2.5"/6 cm square.

Test two (US terms):

- 1) With colour D, in a magic circle, ch3, then 11 dc. Join with sl st to beginning dc. Pull the beginning yarn end tight to close the circle. (12 dc)
- 2) Ch3, then dc in same stitch, and 2dc in next eleven

stitches. Join with invisible join to beginning dc. Break off yarn. (24 dc)

Your test piece should now measure 1.5"/4 cm in diameter.

PATTERN INSTRUCTION NOTES

Individual round notes will be marked in **bold**.

Example: **Note: put stitch markers in 4th, 13th, 22nd and 31st stitches.**

Helpful hints (eg, about stitch placements) will be bracketed, *italicised*, and coloured **red**. Example: Skip first hdc (*the 'hidden' first hdc*)

A ch3 (or ch2) at the beginning of a round always counts as a beginning tr (dc in US terms) or beginning htr (hdc in US terms), unless otherwise stated.

Where you are not working directly into the round below, the relevant round will be **bolded**.

The numbers in brackets at the end of each round's instructions are the numbers of stitches that should be in that round.

A 'hard' repeat (eg, one side of a square) is started with * and ends with **.

A 'soft' repeat (eg, a repeated pattern within each side of a square) is started with << and ends with >>.

Note: when breaking off yarn, remember to leave a nice long tail to make it easier to sew it in securely at the end.
